Yes, even these secular quotes help us to understand how important it is for us to laugh. However, it is sometimes difficult to laugh at ourselves; but, very easy to laugh at someone else.

The Bible has much to say about laughter; and, it is with these fundamental truths we base the premise of, "learning to laugh at the enemy who takes pride in making us sad and lonely...and ourselves...are cures for what ails the soul."

<u>Psalm 126:2</u> ESV "Then our mouth was filled with laughter, and our tongue with shouts of joy; then they said among the nations, "The Lord has done great things for them."

<u>Psalm 37:13</u> ESV "But the Lord laughs at the wicked, for he sees that his day is coming."

On a more serious note: I would like to take up where we left off last year. Remember I used the idea of the EAGLE as an acronym for the lesson to take with us. We are Eagles...and proud of it. I used

E = **Excellence**...Spirit of Excellence.

A = **Accountability**...accountable to yourself, to others, to family, to God.

G = Gracious and Grateful

Teachers, coaches

- **L** = **Loyal**, to Team Mates and to family, to God.
- **E** = **Endurance** Determined to fulfill responsibilities.

S = **Sacrificial**, **sacrificing** to help your team win.

Today I want to use "A" Association: What the "A" Association represented and how it can be part of our life now.

A=Appreciative/Acknowledge...Appreciation for all of the mentors of our lives. If they weren't our parents, they were teachers, coaches, other students who stood for truth and those that you could and can depend on. I say, "Let them know. Acknowledge them...Call them. Email them. Stand toe-to-toe with them and look them in the eye and say, "Thank you."

Acknowledge that you can't make it this life without some help from others.

A = Affirm: Be an affirmer, an encourager; telling others how much their friendship means to you; their action that helped you choose the right way. It can be your spouse, family...your friends, pastor or next door neighbor.

Could have used many other words or character traits that starts with an "A." However, many would not affirm you...lift you up, it would build a wall between us...you to them...instead of a bridge in which character is built on.

Bad character traits---agitator, alibi, argumentative, angry, angelic (could go both ways), annoy, artificial (not real, not a person in whom you can trust).

Athletic = Great word to build a person up (usually male)....but, not really a character building trait. In Abilene, very few with athletic talent...did not have to work at their sport. I don't count the word athletic as a character trait that I would necessarily appreciate. Most of the "A" Association members worked hard to get where they were athletically. They had that "Spirit of Excellence" we talked about last year.

Admirable Attitude = One of the greatest compliments one can give is while telling about someone is that they have an admirable attitude. An attitude that complements, an attitude that is one of giving... instead of getting. An attitude that appealing to others, an attitude of love instead of hate. An attitude that is amenable (willing to follow advice or suggestion; responsible to authority; accountable; open or liable to testing, criticism, or judgment). **American** = I don't know about you, but I am very concerned about America today. I am concerned that this generation does not understand what it means to be an American.

To me...and I know to you, A real American is loyal, faithful, active (not lazy), affective in his endeavors, and dependable in doing his job. We need to pray for our country, pray for our troops, and pray for our family. Prayer is not enough, we need to teach our children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren, the real American traits. I don't apologize for calling myself an American...do you?

Some statistics:

During the Korean War, the U.S. sent about 480,000 troops to support South Korea in their quest for peace and protection of homeland.

The war began in June, 1950, and ended with an armistice signed in July of 1953. The 3 year war cost our country 33,741 precious loved ones that returned in body bags. There were 92,134 brave young soldiers that came back home wounded; some severely. There were over 4,820 missing in action....never to be heard from again by those weeping mothers and fathers. Of the 7,245 U.S. Prisoners of War (POWs), 2,845 died while being held in a POW camp.

As much as we have hated to hear of all the young soldiers losing their lives in the Iraq War (approximately 4,500 at this time), there is no equal comparison as to what happened in "the Forgotten War" (Korea).

Don't get me wrong or feel that I am minimizing the Iraq War casualties and wounded soldiers. Every precious son or daughter who has given the ultimate sacrifice for their country is a hero and deserves the highest honor a country can bestow; but, as far as being a war of wars, Iraq did not have near the number of soldiers killed daily, monthly or annually that the Korean War did.

The Iraq War began in March, 2003, and offensive tactics have been suspended since September, 2010. Where the Iraq offensive by U.S. troops had casualties of an average of 615 per year or 51 per month on the average, the Korean War had over 11,240 plus per year; an average of 912 per month. Now you can see why the moms and dads, brothers and sisters, wives and children were crying themselves to sleep at night as their loved one went off to the "Forgotten War The Vietnam War began in 1954 (though conflict in the region stretched back to the mid-1940s).

More than 3 million people (including 58,000 Americans) were killed in the Vietnam War; more than half were Vietnamese civilians.

By 1969, at the peak of U.S. involvement in the war, more than 500,000 U.S. military personnel were involved in the Vietnam conflict. Growing opposition to the war in the United States led to bitter divisions among Americans, both before and after President Richard Nixon ordered the withdrawal of U.S. forces in 1973.

Personnel

9,087,000 military personnel served on active duty during the Vietnam Era (5 August 1965-7 May 1975)

2,594,000 personnel served within the borders of South Vietnam (1 January 1965 - 28 March 1973)

Another 50,000 men served in Vietnam between 1960 and 1964

Of the nearly 2.6 million, between 1 and 1.6 million (40-60%) either fought in combat, provided close combat support or were at least fairly regularly exposed to enemy attack.

7,484 women served in Vietnam, of whom 6,250 or 83.5% were nurses.

Peak troop strength in Vietnam was 543,482, on 30 April 1969.

Casualties:

Hostile deaths: 47,359

Non-hostile deaths: 10,797

Total: 58,156 (including men formerly classified as MIA and Mayaguez casualties).

WIA: 303,704 - 153,329

Severely disabled: 75,000, 23,214 were classified 100% disabled. 5,283 lost limbs, 1,081 sustained multiple amputations. Amputation or crippling wounds to the lower extremities were 300% higher than in WWII and 70% higher than in Korea. Multiple amputations occurred at the rate of 18.4% compared to 5.7% in WWII.

MIA: 2,338

POW: 766, of whom 114 died in captivity.

Reservists KIA: 5,977

Once upon a time when our politicians did not tend to <u>apologize</u> for our country's prior actions, here's a refresher on how some of our former patriots handled negative comments about our great country.

JFK'S Secretary of State, Dean Rusk, was in France in the early 60's when DeGaulle decided to pull out of NATO. DeGaulle said he wanted all US military out of France as soon as possible. Rusk responded, "Does that include those who are buried here?" DeGaulle did not respond.

When in England , at a fairly large conference, Colin Powell was asked by the Archbishop of Canterbury if our plans for Iraq were just an example of 'empire building' by George Bush. The only amount of land we have ever asked for in return is enough to bury those that did not return."

There was a conference in France where a number of international engineers were taking part, including French and American.
