A REPEAT: How many times is the word "ALL" mentioned in the bible?

- ✓ The word "all" is in the King James Version of The Bible 5621 times. It is in 4664 verses.
- ✓ The Greek word for all is "pas." It can mean each, every, everything, any, all, the whole, complete, etc. The word "pas" is used over 1200 times in the New Testament.

What does it mean that "God will be ALL IN ALL" in 1 Corinthians 15:28?

1 Corinthians 15:28 ESV

"When all things are subjected to him, then the Son himself will also be subjected to him who put all things in subjection under him, that God **may be** all in all."

"Then, when all things are under his authority, the Son will put himself under God's authority, so that God, who gave his Son authority over all things, **will be** utterly supreme over everything everywhere." 1 Corinthians 15:28, NLT

A Biblical Look at Authority in the Godhead:

The three Persons of the triune Godhead voluntarily submit to each other respecting the roles.

- They perform in creation and salvation. So, the Father sent the Son into the world (1 John 4:10). These roles are never reversed in Scripture: the Son never sends the Father. Likewise, the Holy Spirit is sent by Jesus and "proceeds from the Father" to testify of Christ (John 14:26; 15:26). And Jesus perfectly submitted His will to the Father's (Luke 22:42; Hebrews 10:7).
- Biblically, all three Persons of the Trinity have the same essence, nature, and glory, but each One has different roles or activities when it comes to how God relates to the world. For example, our salvation is based on the Father's power and love (John 3:16; 10:29), the Son's death and resurrection (1 John 2:2; Ephesians 2:6), and the Spirit's regeneration and seal (Ephesians 4:30; Titus 3:5). The different tasks that we see the Father, Son, and Spirit perform are the result of the eternal relationship that exists among the Persons of the Trinity.

God's being "all in all" is rooted in the truth of Jesus' resurrection and the resultant future, when <u>Christ returns</u> and "the Son himself will be made subject to him who put everything under him, so that God may be all in all" (<u>1</u> <u>Corinthians 15:28</u>).

NOTE: Remember last week when I told you that we should not take one verse in the Bible and base our theology on that one verse. The verse has to be put in context. It doesn't mean that the verse is not true, somewhat true, misleading...No, it is true!

So...let's see where this verse is important in context with all others:

- Paul begins <u>1 Corinthians 15</u> by discussing the <u>gospel message</u>, namely, that Jesus died, was buried, rose from the dead, and appeared to many witnesses (<u>1 Corinthians 15:1–11</u>).
- Some of the Corinthians had been claiming the resurrection was a false doctrine (1 Corinthians 15:12). Paul counters that the resurrection of Jesus and of those who believe in the gospel is crucial for the present process of becoming holy and the Christian's future glorification. As Paul states in 1 Corinthians 15:17–19, if the resurrection of Jesus is a false reality, the Christian's future resurrection is not a reality. Without the resurrection of Christ, the Christian is "of **all** men most to be pitied."
- Paul makes a clear defense of the resurrection of Christ beginning in 1 Corinthians 15:20. This resurrection will lead to a future resurrection for all those who have life through faith in Him. Jesus was the first person to be raised from the dead, never to die again. His is an eternal resurrection.
- As Jesus has led the way, other events will follow: the rapture (believers who have died before Jesus comes will be resurrected when He comes (1 Corinthians 15:23), and those believers still living will be made incorruptible and be raised (transformed) with and unto Jesus (1 Corinthians 15:50–58; cf. 1 Thessalonians 4:13–17).


Note:

- After Jesus comes back to earth again with His bride (the church), He will bind Satan, set up an <u>earthly kingdom</u>, and physically rule for 1,000 years (Revelation 20:1–6).
- At the end of that time, Satan will be <u>released</u> from imprisonment, and Satan and his followers will rebel and be <u>destroyed</u> (<u>Revelation 20:5–10</u>).
- Jesus will then give authority back to the Father, and He Himself will be in subjection to the Father.
 - ✓ It's based on these truths that Paul claims, "God may be all in all." Ultimately, *all in all* is an expression of the rightful authority that God possesses.
 - ✓ In the future, when evil has been eradicated forever, God will reign as the unchallenged Supreme over all the universe. He will be the one and only Ruler of all hearts and lives and the only desire of His creatures. When God is **all in all**, our redemption will be fully accomplished, and God's glory will fill all creation (cf. <u>Psalm</u> 72:19).
 - ✓ God's being "all in all" is expressed in the NLT as being "utterly supreme over everything, everywhere." The last

enemy to be destroyed is death. For the Scriptures say, 'God has put all things under his (Jesus) authority.' . . . Then, when all things are under his authority, the Son will put himself under God's authority, so that God, who gave his Son authority over all things, will be utterly supreme over everything everywhere" (1 Corinthians 15:23–28, NLT).

According to 1 Corinthians 15:28, Jesus will practically continue in an eternal submission to God the Father. However, Jesus is equal with God as the Second Person of the Trinity (John 8:58, He is the image of God. Just as God has absolute authority as Creator, Jesus has absolute authority as Creator. Colossians 1:15–16 states, "He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For by Him all things were created that are in heaven and that are on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers. All things were created through Him and for Him." Colossians 3:11 states, "Where there is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcised nor uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave nor free, but Christ is all and in all.
